

Jesus' death on the cross, His burial and resurrection, is the greatest event in history and has had a huge impact on my life. Accepting Jesus as my Saviour has brought me a vision of God's love and hope for the future. Life has never been the same since I came to the foot of the cross and chose to accept Jesus and be His disciple. Our Conference Discipleship Ministries Team have developed a great definition of discipleship: "Discipleship is the lifelong process of Learning to Follow Jesus to become more like Him for the Benefit of Others."

This is not about me, but about Jesus. My heart wants to please Him because He loves me so

much (John 3:16). Being more like Jesus comes out of being devoted to Him. He gives me a new heart and puts his Spirit in me (Ezekiel 36:26), which changes what my heart wants. Instead of making excuses for my sinful behaviour, my desire is to present my body as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to Him (Romans 12:1).

This year, our Discipleship team has focused on providing resources such as Follow 23 and Read the Bible in a Year. This has been valuable for myself in practicing a life of devotion to God, and I have enjoyed engaging with Him in reading Scripture and prayer. These are disciplines that I have followed for many years as a disciple of




Jesus. I do this because I am devoted to Jesus, not to gain any merit. Over the years, there have been struggles and some inconsistency, but I always come back to it because it brings me to the water of life – Jesus Christ.

My devotion to Jesus is not about me, and I am challenged to think about the benefit of others. If you read the book of Acts, the focus is on mission and sharing the story of Jesus in words and action. A real focus of devotion to Jesus is to be part of His community – the body of Christ or the Church. The facts are that the church does not exist for itself. It exists for the benefit to others. The light on the hill or the salt in the world (Matt 5:13-16). Any actions or words are to glorify God not us. It is never about us.

Next year, our Discipleship Ministry Team will focus on small groups. This is very Acts 2:42-47 – meeting together, devoting time to teaching, prayer, Lord's Supper, generosity, and worship of God. This biblical model was not just about the believer, but about new people. Each day the Lord added to their group those who were being saved

In your devotion to God, think about how you can start up a small group or a different kind of Sabbath kind of School class that resembles the New Testament model. Resist the temptation of only focusing on teaching and include prayer, the Lord's Supper regularly, acts of generosity and worship of God. Make sure what you do is for the benefit of others. By the time you read this, it will be getting close to Christmas and the New Year. Christmas is a great time to remember the greatest gift – Jesus Christ. In the New Year, think and plan to be part of a small group that imitates the New Testament rather than your comfort zone.



Devotional

About six years ago, the idea of owning and riding a motorbike became incredibly attractive. The thought of enjoying fun weekend rides with a group of young guys from the church I pastored, who had a passion for motorbike riding, seemed like something I'd love. The only problem was that I'd never owned or ridden a bike.

So, I decided to enrol in a riding course to get my motorbike licence. After attending lessons, I quickly realised that not everything about motorbike riding was fun. I didn't like the protective gear I had to wear because it felt uncomfortable and hot, the posture of sitting on the bike felt unnatural and tiring, and even the fear of being hit by a car. These were some of the reasons that made me give up. To this day, I still don't have a motorbike licence and can't ride one because I wasn't devoted to that cause.

It's never easy to persist in situations of difficulty and resistance. I can think of several times in my life when I haven't persisted, especially when things were challenging.

We are a generation that values convenience and quick results. With a few clicks of your computer, you can have your grocery shopping delivered to your door, or if you're hungry, there's a microwave or a drive-through lane around the corner. As a matter of experience, our ability to persist is significantly reduced. But we know too well that, in most cases, anything worth having or experiencing doesn't come easy.

In the Bible, Jesus taught the value of persistence and devotion. In Luke 18, He tells the parable of the widow whose only attribute to success was her persistence. Jesus uses the story to highlight that this lady had nothing going for her except



her persistence. The concept of a widow was to underscore her deep and utter helplessness. As a woman without a husband in that culture, she didn't have much clout to command attention from anyone, let alone a judge. The only reason she got what she needed was simply because of her persistence and devotion. That's why the story begins with these words:

"Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up."

In 2016, Angela Duckworth, a researcher and psychologist, wrote a book called 'Grit: The Power of Passion and Perseverance'. In it, she writes from her own story and personal experience of being ordinary and without any real talent, trying to fit into a family of high achievers, with a dad who was a scientist. Angela explores the idea that success isn't solely determined by talent, but also by the combination of passion and perseverance, which Duckworth terms "grit." The book argues that individuals who cultivate a deep interest in a particular pursuit and then commit themselves to long-term, focused effort are more likely to achieve success than those who rely solely on talent or intelligence.

I think as a church, we Seventh-day Adventists need some grit. With all the effort and hard work we've put into the mission, it can be discouraging when we don't see results commensurate with our efforts, making it easy for us to give up and conclude that the mission doesn't work anymore.

If you're tempted to be discouraged, I urge you to draw inspiration from the New Testament church as portrayed in the book of Acts. They demonstrated grit in a powerful way.

In Acts 2:42, we read:

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer."

There are a couple of key ideas I want to highlight from this text.

The first is the word "Devoted". This word in the original Greek language, *proskartereó*, has a rich meaning. It means "to continue to do something with intense effort, with the possible implication of despite difficulty – to devote oneself to, to keep on, to persist in".

The second idea is that the early church was devoted in two aspects. First, their relationship with God, captured in their devotion to the teachings of Scripture. And second, their relationship with each other. It can be said they were devoted to both vertical and horizontal relationships. I believe these two go hand in hand.

As a Conference, in 2023 we have focused on devotion to God. Just like the early believers, that is key and foundational. Next year, in 2024, we are adding a second dimension similar to the early church, which is our horizontal relationships. We need both in our walk with God. As we learn to love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength, we are to love our neighbours as ourselves. And Jesus ends by saying, "There is no other commandment greater than these" (Mark 12:30-31).

This year's Literature Evangelists (LE) Summit took place at the beautiful Watson Park Convention Centre in Brisbane, Queensland. Leaders arrived on Sunday, October 22 and delegates, LEs, and guests arrived on October 24. The WA Conference had seven representatives this year, including four LEs.

We were fortunate to have great speakers from the GC - Pr Steven Apola, the Australian Union - Pr Terry Johnson and Pr Nicu Dumbrava, alongside esteemed authors like Sue Rad and Sukeshinie Goonatilleke, among other pastors and motivators.





The school and its community will miss Mrs Rogers. She has been an important part of many young people's lives as an educator throughout the years, as well as serving on our Board of Directors. We want to




thank Mrs Rogers for her dedication in serving our mission, her passion and enthusiasm for quality Adventist Education, and the way that she supported the school community.

REPORTABLE CONDUCT SCHEME NOTICE

The Western Australia Reportable Conduct Scheme (the Scheme) applies to religious organisations from 1 January 2024, with the Ombudsman responsible for administering the Scheme. The Scheme requires the Western Australian (WA) Conference, in partnership with Adsafe, to notify the Ombudsman and investigate reportable allegations and reportable convictions involving:

- volunteers who provide services to children; and
- religious leaders such as pastors and possibly elders.

Reportable allegations under the Scheme are:

- sexual misconduct and physical assault against or in the presence of a child – someone under 18 years of age.
- significant neglect and emotional or psychological harm against a child.

Any allegation of this nature should be reported to the local pastor, WA Conference or Adsafe immediately.

It is important that volunteers who provide services to children and religious leaders such as elders are provided the Ombudsman's Information Sheet 7 so they can be aware of the Scheme and its impact on them from 1 January 2024. This information sheet can be accessed from your church pastor, church clerk and the Ombudsman website.
