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

To be honest, it had been a long time since I had seen him. Josh travelled all the way from the mining town of Paraburdoo, which is just over 1500 km from Perth. He had his wife and four children with him, and they had a fantastic time. The kids loved their programs and Josh and his wife Ronny said they will be back. This was the first time for many years they had


been to a church event and there is no church in Paraburdoo that they can attend. Josh told me he was moved emotionally as he attended the meetings and felt the leading of the Holy Spirit to make a fresh commitment to follow Jesus. For me, stories like this make Camp worthwhile people connecting with Jesus.

Another highlight for me was "Family Worship" at 7:30 am in the Big Tent. Music led by the Gibson family, also known as "One Accord", was a great way to start the day. Then the Pratt family shared neat little thoughts on nature, brand names, and the mission pioneers of Australia. It was great to see young families, youth and more

senior folk come together – I love intergenerational events. It was a great reminder of the passion to share faith that the early Adventist Church had and this needs to be recaptured. In

the end, Easter Camp is not about us, but about the mission of Jesus Christ. As Pavel Goia said several times, if we go back to our churches and sit around singing Kum-ba-yah, then what is the point? Jesus is wanting us to be His people, making a difference in our neighborhoods, schools, and families.

Finance Update

A friend recently sent me one of those pithy sayings that went something like this, "When I was young, I was scared of the dark. Now when I see my electricity bill, I am scared of the lights!" The news has been full of cost of living increases, including rising interest rates, and wages not keeping pace with these cost increases. I have no doubt that our church members are beginning to feel the strain and have had to "tighten the belt", so to speak, on the family finances.

I am pleased to report that \$9,955,000 total tithe was received in 2022. An increase of 3.7% on tithe received during 2021. The graph below shows total tithe received for the last ten years.

As we are reminded in 1 Chronicles 29:14, God continues to bless his faithful followers by providing them with the ability to give this much. We thank each of you for your faithfulness in returning to God the portion he asks for.

The additional tithe received will assist the Conference in employing two additional ministers from 2024 and allow us to increase the amount of tithe reversion available to each church.

It was exciting to see our annual Easter Camp return. Staff commented that they felt "out of rhythm" with all that was required to be done in preparation. Most campers I had the opportunity of speaking to commented that this was the most relaxed camp they recall attending, and how good it was to be back meeting again. Our Sabbath morning offering went to the Catalyst programme and we collected just over \$11,000. Again, a big thank you for your contribution to this important youth focused programme.

Much has been said about the extended dam at Camp Mornington. This work is all but complete and the dam is now waiting for the winter rains to fill up. The picture above shows the dam looking towards the front entrance to the property and the water level is no where near full. A huge thank you to the many volunteers who offered their time and expertise to get the job done. Our managers, Calvin and Jaclyn Shotter, have worked very hard to coordinate all this work while hosting various groups. Thank you Calvin and Jaclyn for the tireless efforts you put in each week, it is appreciated.



The new managers house is nearing completion and once the necessary approvals have been sought, work will begin on the new kitchen/dining hall and dormitory upgrades.

Advent Park has just taken possession of a new office that will be used during the year to check campers in and out. The previous office

was located in the managers house which was not ideal.


Renovations and the like have begun on the building purchased for the Karla Bidjar church in Midland. A new exterior fence is being installed which will assist with site security. We are

grateful for the security funding provided by Risk Management Service to help offset the cost of the new fence.

Work continues apace with the new Early Learning Centre at Vic Park Christian School. Enrolments continue to grow at this school and the staff are eagerly waiting to gain access to the new classrooms. While we have experienced some minor delays waiting on building supplies, we hope to receive practical completion of this building by mid-June.

By the time you read this, work will have begun on the new building at Rossmoyne Waters. While there have been some challenging delays, we believe we are now on track to deliver another high quality building for the over 55's and those

requiring residential aged care. This the biggest project to date in our Conference and we ask you to add this important project to your prayer lists that all will go smoothly and we can finish the building on time and on budget.



This report has been

longer than intended. However, you will see there is much going on in and around our Conference. There is much to be thankful for and we are grateful for the continued leading of our Lord and Saviour.

God Wants to Hear From You

For some people, praying is as natural as breathing. They easily converse with the King of the Universe as if He were casually sitting with them at the breakfast table. Others feel awkward talking to someone they can't see. touch, or hear. They fear that God is judging them on how eloquent their prayers are. Although they believe in God, they can't really visualize or feel connected to Him. Because they are not comfortable praying, soon they stop trying altogether and drift further and further away from God. But the truth is, there is no such thing as "a perfect prayer!" God is not checking your grammar or communication skills. He just wants you to talk to Him heart-to-heart, friend-to-friend, and He truly listens, hears and answers. Your prayers are not insignificant. Your voice matters in heaven.

The only way to get to know Jesus as your Best Friend, is to spend time with Him through prayer and study of His Word. Forming a close friendship with anyone takes time and communication. Conversation between new friends tends to be guarded, but as you spend time together, it becomes easier and easier to open up and share your life. Before you realize it, the awkwardness is gone and in its place is a comfortable friendship where you feel loved, accepted and safe. So it is with God. The more time you spend talking to Him, the greater understanding you will have of His deep and abiding love for you, and the closer you become. Prayer time will feel as comfortable as talking to your best friend you've known for years.

You can communicate with God in many different ways: silently or out loud, written or memorized, publicly or privately. There are even prayers that you sing. Whichever way you choose to pray doesn't matter to God, He just wants you to talk to Him. And when you do, remember that prayer isn't only to ask God to give you things or help you when you're in trouble. God loves



to hear your praises and thank you prayers too. And don't forget to confess your sins and ask for forgiveness

Just like conversation between friends helps you get to know each other better, prayer helps you to get to know God better. When you pray, you're spending quality time with someone who loves you more than anyone else possibly could. He not only loves you but He has the power to answer each prayer and He does so according to what "He knows" is best for you. Inspired by Wellness

When did you last visit your doctor—not because you were sick—but because you wished to thrive? Not for a drug prescription, but for lifestyle empowerment?

I was privileged to attend the ELIA Wellness¹ Summit, held 24-26 March 2023 at Sydney Adventist Hospital, with around 250 medical professionals and health enthusiasts from across our church's South Pacific Division. We were encouraged to think of wellness—not just in terms of disease prevention—but to attain a positive health score; being better than 'not sick' by means of a whole-person approach to life.

We were treated to information sessions ranging from the evidence behind the 7 Dimensions of Wellness, the emerging success of 10,000 Toes for diabetes prevention in the Pacific, and ideas for implementing ELIA Wellness Hubs in our own communities. Presentations by Dr Geraldine Przybylko, Professor Darren Morton and others were interspersed with fun fitness

sessions led by Todd Brodie, and opportunities to meet like-minded people from Australia and the South Pacific region. Dr Peter Landless spoke powerfully about the benefits of a blended ministry combining health and spirituality. It was very evident that these leaders had both a heart for people and God.

A highlight for me was the official opening of the ELIA Lifestyle Medicine Centre at the Sydney Adventist Hospital. Brett Goods, CEO for Adventist HealthCare (and brother of our President in WA, Pr Steve Goods), pointed out that it's the first of its kind in Australia to be associated with an acute-care hospital. This will allow, for example, a surgeon who repairs a coronary occlusion to refer his patient to the ELIA Lifestyle Medicine Centre where he will be supported into health-changing habits to make him truly well. Or, perhaps, a pre-diabetic patient will seek lifestyle support to reverse her condition before she becomes another statistic in the non-

communicable diseases pandemic. The Member for Berowra, Julian Leeser, officiated in the opening and spoke touchingly of his appreciation for the San (the name locals give to Sydney Adventist Hospital). He committed to becoming one of the first patients in the ELIA Lifestyle Medicine Centre, where nutritionists, personal trainers, mental health practitioners and doctors work as a team to facilitate whole-person health.

I came away from the summit with a greater understanding of the mission of lifestyle medicine, a sense of pride in my church's cuttingedge health work, and a quiver full of resources to make my local church an asset to my community. The evidence-based resources and training opportunities provided by ELIA Wellness make it easy for you and I to support life changing health in our communities with a flexible program of clubs, knowledge sharing, and tools for culture change. You get to create a plan that will work best for your context, whether small or grand.

Thank You, Esther Robartson

Few contributors to Adventist Education, within Western Australia, stand out more radiantly than Miss Robartson. Over her long career, Esther served in many schools, both public and Christian, and she had a profound influence over thousands of lives. She will always be remembered as an amazing, positive contributor who made a real difference in the lives of others to whom she was teacher, dean, colleague or friend.

In her dealings with the young and old, Esther demonstrated the textbook standard for balancing fairness, firmness and friendliness. She knew how to effectively pull a lively, tenyear old boy into line while maintaining a friendly, personal and enduring relationship with him. She consistently displayed an authentic, personal interest in everyone around her and consequently developed a multitude of life-long friendships. Highly respected by her colleagues, Esther was always a valued team member for her wit and wisdom and contributed consistently well beyond the call to duty.

Following her 1956 graduation from Claremont Teachers' College, Esther's career commenced in the rural town of Salmon Gums, in the eastern wheatbelt of Western Australia. There she taught unassisted with 52 lower-primary aged students for two years. From there she returned to her hometown of Merredin where she completed her four-year bond with the State Education Department. Esther then joined the Adventist school system and served in Wiluna and Karalundi. In 1965 and 1966 Esther served in PNG as a teacher and as a dean to a dormitory of 100 girls at Kambubu. Esther then returned to Western Australia and taught for nine years in Adventist schools, including Victoria Park. After a few short years of leave of absence, Esther taught at the Bickley Adventist School where she also served as principal. Then,

after three years of serving at Carmel College as Dean of Women, Esther returned to Merredin to care for her elderly parents while she also taught locally. In 1994 Esther accepted the role of principal at the Esperance



Adventist School where she served until her retirement at the end of 2000. Not being one to sit idle, Esther then travelled to Galway, in the Republic of Ireland, where, for five further years she taught in that country's only protestant school and ended up serving there as headmistress. Upon returning to Merredin in 2005, Esther, in her eventual retirement, became heavily involved in her community with an unsurprising emphasis on service to others.

Throughout her life, Esther encouraged and demonstrated Christian values. Her faith was strong and her trust in her Saviour unwavering. She expressed openly an appreciation of having had such a wonderful life, and one that was filled with loving family and friends. Esther was indeed a lady of trust, faith and hope, and despite her passing, continues to serve as an encouragement and an inspiration to us all. Adventist Schools were greatly blessed by the immense contribution of Miss Robartson, and today continue to offer meaningful, values-based learning from Christian teachers who share Esther's passion.

Miss Sitienei, from Perth, Western Australia, could have pursued any career after graduating with outstanding results in 2022, including being ranked in the top 0.5 per cent in the state for English. But her heart was set on medicine after reading Dr Carson's book, "Gifted Hands", in primary school.

"The book details the story of Dr Carson's life where despite the odds he was born with, particularly being black in America and having a very turbulent family life, he was able to become the youngest chief of paediatric neurosurgery in the United States at the age of only 33," Miss Sitienei said.

"His success and steadfast faith really inspired me to the point where I also really wanted to be a paediatric neurosurgeon as well! "I found a lot of my own story mirroring his own. Facing a lot of racism amongst other forms of discrimination as a young African girl, it was very easy to become disheartened after a while. But I thank God that there were the right people at the right time along the way, such as my parents as well as my church family."

Miss Sitienei, 18, is a first-year student at Curtin Medical School. Born in Birmingham, England, she migrated to Australia with her family in 2008. For the past 10 years the family has attended Livingston Adventist church.

"[Starting medical studies] is honestly one of the most exciting things I've ever been a part of and a tremendous blessing and privilege," she said.

"All in all, I'm very glad to be here and am incredibly humbled by this opportunity."

School Community Fights for Down Syndrome Classmate

Students from Victoria Park Christian School in Perth are celebrating the news that two of their classmates will now be able to stay in Australia.

Aaryan Kollikkara, 10, his sister Aaryasree, 8, and their parents, Aneesh Kollikkara and Krishna Aneesh, were facing deportation to India after they were denied permanent residency visas. Immigration knocked back the visas because Aaryan lives with Down Syndrome, a condition deemed to be potentially costly for Australia's health system. However, on Wednesday (March 8), Immigration Minister Andrew Giles intervened in the case, confirming that the family would be granted permanent residency.

Aaryan is in Year 4 and Aaryasree in Year 3 at Victoria Park Christian School, an Adventist school in Perth's south-eastern suburbs. News of their imminent deportation saw their classmates spring into action. They wrote letters to the Immigration Minister, appealing to him to intervene and allow the family to remain in Australia.

School principal Felicity Drinkall is proud of the students' efforts.

"The children are so caring, very accepting and have beautiful kind hearts," Mrs Drinkall said. "The classes had also been praying for Mr Giles because they know he has a difficult job and it's hard to make these decisions."

Aaryan's mum Krishna said she is thankful for the love and care shown to her children by the school community.

"I'm proud to say that these are the values taught and spread by the teachers and school community at Victoria Park Christian School and really glad that we are part of such a great community," she said.

ADRA's evolving disaster response in the WA

Disasters are messy, painful and humbling even to the most experienced emergency planners. They have the potential to impact communities in devastating ways. ADRA, as the humanitarian arm of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, has been helping people in Western Australia (WA) during disasters for many years, relying heavily on the work of volunteers who graciously give their time and expertise to meet the needs of those impacted. As we recover from COVID-19 and prepare for the increasingly frequent and severe weather events associated with changing climate, there is a need to build our volunteer capacity in WA. What follows is an overview of how ADRA has worked in WA in the past, and what ADRA Australia is doing now to prepare for future needs when disasters strike.

Since 2007, ADRA has been responsible for managing the emergency accommodation needs of evacuees and emergency personnel during large scale disaster responses. This was through a memorandum of understanding with the WA Department of Emergency Relief and Support (previously the Department for Community Development). The local WA Conference ADRA Director, with the help of dedicated volunteers, participated in handling over six major disasters during that time. The two largest of these were cyclone Seroja in 2021, and the WA bushfires of 2014. There is no doubt that

this was important work, and ADRA wishes to sincerely thank both the volunteers and the WA Department of Emergency Relief and Support for the goodwill and opportunity to successfully execute this role so well!

After carefully considering the current volunteer capacity in WA, and consulting with ADRA Australia, the WA Conference recently made the decision to transition away from its current role in managing emergency accommodation. The reasoning behind this decision is essentially two-fold. Firstly, there is a need to grow and maintain the volunteer population in order to continue to meet the logistical demands of more frequent and severe natural disasters. Secondly, and most importantly, there is capacity to meet a broader range of needs through local Seventhday Adventist Churches. Our churches are full of people who care deeply about their community and who have the capacity to help in ways they often haven't thought of - ways that meet not only the immediate needs of people impacted by disasters, but also their longer-term needs. This also creates an opportunity for local churches to connect with their local community in an ongoing way, and to show Jesus' love in tangible ways. ADRA remains committed to assisting our communities affected by disaster and is shifting its focus to support local churches as they build their capacity and prepare to respond.



Local people have a crucial role in times of disaster. It is local people who are likely to be the first on the scene, meeting needs until help arrives. Critical help from various government and non-government groups may last for a time, but it is the local people who will be there for the long haul. ADRA Australia, assisted by the local WA Conference ADRA Regional Manager, is partnering with local churches, and assisting them to be better prepared to help their community through a program called the Disaster Ready Church (DRC). As part of this program, ADRA Australia's Emergency Management Team is facilitating a series of twoday workshops for local church groups in disaster prone regions. Participants at these workshops will engage in meaningful conversations, identify vulnerabilities in their local context, and begin planning for disaster response activities.

Imagine if Seventh-day Adventist Churches everywhere were pre-prepared with disaster response plans? Considering our local context and working in consultation with local government and other groups is crucial to effective disaster planning. In the wake of recent disaster events such as the Fitzroy Crossing floods and Cyclone Ilsa this year, the Eastern states Black Summer bushfires of 2019-2020, the NSW Northern Rivers flood events of 2022, and the global COVID-19 pandemic, there is growing recognition across all levels of government that community centered disaster responses are more effective and produce better recovery outcomes. Local governments are keener than ever to partner with local entities and include them in disaster preparedness planning. ADRA's Disaster Ready Church workshops can help churches identify what their unique contribution could be to a community impacted by a disaster, allowing them to know what they have to offer when approaching their local council. Prior planning is the best way to reduce vulnerabilities, increase resilience, and streamline funding pathways for more effective disaster responses.

In February this year, volunteers from Bunbury, Manjimup, Busselton, Collie, Capel, and Maida Vale churches attended a Disaster Ready Church Workshop at the Bunbury Seventh-day Adventist Church. The South West is particularly prone to bushfires and storms, but other hazards can also strike unexpectedly. Bunbury and Manjimup are now forming teams within their churches to guide on a preparedness journey with the support of ADRA Australia.

Pr Ross Craig from Manjimup Seventh-day Adventist Church commented, "The way the workshop was presented was inspiring. The focus was on the strengths our church already has. When I went back to Manjimup Church and shared with the congregation, it gave us all a lift. We are now making plans for how we could help our community when a disaster strikes using what we already have."

One of the most overlooked disaster resilience building activities is social connection. Building friendly connections within your neighbourhood before disasters will allow you to better identify those in need and support their recovery after a disaster. Are you making time to connect with your neighbours?

We don't know when the next disaster will strike. The time to prepare is now.

Construction Underway at Mamarapha College

Mamarapha College has received support from churches across Australia to help fund new buildings for administration and staff.

In 2022, mission offerings were taken up to help fund the building of two general learning areas, a computer lab, a student area, as well as the refurbishment of the administration block at Mamarapha College.

Mamarapha College first opened its doors to Indigenous students in 1997 for those wanting to receive training in gospel ministry. Since then, more than 1500 students have graduated and are serving in remote areas as well as large urban cities. The new General Learning Area (GLA) facilities are designed to cater for the growth trend in enrolments and provide additional spaces to deliver new vocational courses in the future.

The GLA was designed by specialised educational architects to provide a quality learning environment and delivery to a larger cohort of students compared to the old classroom capacity.

The administration building has now been fitted with much-needed storage space, additional offices, a staff workroom and a Faith FM studio. The new buildings and office have been in operation since early 2023, with the final addition of a radio tower which is yet to be completed.





According to Mamarapha principal, Pastor David Garrard, these new developments have created much excitement for students and staff.

"Many students have commented on the computer lab which is now three times larger compared to the previous one." He continued, "Staff have expressed their gratitude for the extra room, new equipment, and furniture."

Pastor Garrard said, "All staff and students consider it a great privilege to be part of this significant milestone in Mamarapha's history. We are all praising God for making our dreams come true."

Australian Union Conference (AUC) Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Ministries (ATSIM) director pastor Darren Garlett said, "As a Church, we value the work of God in the lives of people who have made a commitment to Him.

Through Mamarapha College we witness this transformation happening in the lives of students each year as they embark on the study program."

He continued, "Receiving financial support to enhance the facilities to make the Mamarapha experience even better is a real answer to prayer. We have a training centre where people can learn but it makes an impact as soon as they arrive on the campus".

The official opening of the new buildings is planned for May 2023.
