Chatting about life with friends around a camp fire is a special memory. There is something about gazing into the flames that has a relaxing and almost spiritual element. If you put enough wood on the fire late at night, when you wake up in the morning, there may be enough hot coals to get the fire going again (with a little coaxing).

I can remember waking up early on a cold morning and going across to the previous night's fire to find just ashes. I had no paper or matches, but I gathered kindling, and went back to gently dig into the grey cold ashes with a stick. There was a hint of warmth and a glimmer of red under the grey. Patiently placing a small bundle of

leaves and twigs on the coals, I knelt and began to gently blow. Then the glimmer of red grew a little brighter. There was a waft of smoke, and then a burst of small flame.

Patiently gathering larger sticks and placing them in a pattern that allows the fire to breathe, leads the fire to grow in brightness and warmth. The stoking of a fire is a good illustration of our spiritual life. If we neglect to keep the fuel coming the fire will quickly die down and lose both it's radiance and heat. How do we keep our faith shining? How do we keep it exuding the warmth and grace of Jesus Christ our Saviour? If we are honest, our walk with Jesus can lose its

vibrancy and warmth as described by John about the church in Ephesus in Revelation 2:6. "But I have this complaint against you. You do not love me or each other as you did at first."

Loss of love for Jesus and others is often associated with discontent, discouragement, or even criticism. It is like the flame of faith has died down and there is just a pile of grey ashes with no evidence of light or warmth. The world we live in is toxic to faith. It does everything possible to dampen down the flame of light that Jesus placed in our hearts

when we came to believe in him. I know from personal experience that sometimes the flame flickers and joy does too. What can we do to keep our faith shining? To keep the flame burning, we need to trust in Jesus.

Taking time reading scripture and reflecting in prayer and meditation is critical to keep the flame going. This is not an act of legalism, but an

act of trust and reliance on God. Daily devotions are like fuel on the fire. Sometimes I leave that time still feeling a bit flat. However, I know from experience that God will use it at some time, in some place, to keep the light of hope shining in my life. In 2023 our Discipleship Ministries team is going to provide resources and ideas to encourage churches and individuals to connect with Jesus on a daily basis. However, you do not need to wait for these resources. You can start again by simply reading a gospel such as Mark. Underlining key words helps me concentrate. I also write down a few thoughts which I reflect on in prayer.

Many of you are experienced followers of a devotional life and can share your story with others. There is something about receiving grace and love from God that motivates us to share. Faith that comes from gratitude is contagious. This is the work of the Holy Spirit, who is the living fire of God that transforms our lives. The Spirit of God is at work in our lives and in the lives of those around us. It transforms our experience through a miracle of grace – it is not about us anymore - it is about Jesus and wanting to share Him with others. We start to pray for people, look

"My dream is to see every person sharing Jesus in rhythm with God's heart" for opportunities to help, and make a difference for God. People are not projects, but they are individuals who God loves and wants to come to Him.

I have been reflecting on Paul's letter to Timothy in which he encourages him to fan the flames of the spiritual gift God gave him. He reminds Timothy

that God does not give us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power, love, and self-discipline (See 2 Timothy 1:3-6). As we connect with God, He is the one who builds our faith. My dream is to see every person sharing Jesus—in rhythm with God's heart. Coming into God's presence daily helps me to grow

a little more like Jesus and be in tune with His heart. Keep the light shining that Jesus has put in your

life through faith.

WA Conference 3 Year Strategic Focus Areas

Practical Impact on the Ground

The term 'discipleship' has been a buzzword for a few years now. It can mean different things to different people. Our Discipleship Ministries Team in WA has chosen to define discipleship as a lifelong process of learning to follow Jesus, to become more like Him, for the benefit of others.

Through this process we choose to **follow** Jesus, we **grow** as we become more like Him, and the overflow is that we **engage** with others in a way that benefits them.

Imagine what our church would be like if we not only all knew God in a cerebral sense, but also tanglibly experienced the love of God as we connect with Him daily.

In the February 2021 Australian Union Conference Attendance Survey, we discovered that 73% of Western Australian participants said their relationship with God was growing or growing strongly. This is good news! However, the statistics in this area are not always so positive.

The Barna Group, in their State of the Church survey found that in 2020, 69% of participants said they pray weekly, while **only 35% said they read their bible weekly**. Admittedly these are American statistics, but I wonder if they would be much different in Australia?

2023: Loving God

There are positive benefits from connecting to God daily. A Pew Research Center study found that highly religious people (defined as those who say they pray every day and attend religious services each week) are generally happier with their life. Daily devotion can help change perspective and gain peace.

Imagine what our church in WA would be like if we all gave a single focus to deepening our relationships with God. Learning more about who He is and experiencing His love. For 2023 we invite you on a journey to connect with God each day, to reignite and strengthen your devotional life.

2024: Loving Fellowship

We are meant to be the church together. This might look like investing time in a bible study group, connecting deeper with your sabbath school class, a bushwalk group or having a prayer partner. Or it might look like something else. When we dedicate time to connect with each other and to God, we grow closer together to become like family, not only in name but in action.

Imagine what our church in WA would be like if we invested time into building and strengthening those spiritual connections







we find in our church family. During 2024 our journey as a conference will focus on our relationships with each other.

2025: Loving Others

In February, the South Pacific Division engaged McCrindle to conduct a survey into the perceptions of Australians and New Zealanders towards the Seventh-day Adventist denomination. For Australia, 43% of participants were familiar with but did not feel positively towards us. Only 14% were familiar with us and felt positive. We definitely have some work to do!

Imagine what our WA church would be like if we truly understood God's passion for all people, valued them through God's eyes—and because of that understanding—poured love on the Australian community with extravagant generosity. Generous not only with our finances but also being generous with our time and energy. What would our church family look like? What would it be like to be part of?

Our focus in WA during 2025 will be our presence in the community, with an encouraging influence and showing extravagant love.

Elegant Simplicity

We hope that by focusing on daily devotions, spiritual connectedness and extravagant love, we can help support and strengthen our discipleship culture across Western Australia. This vision is not new or cutting edge! However our Discipleship Ministires Team believe it is through small, consistent actions—with the help of the Holy Spirit—that we can have a significant impact in WA.

Our focus areas each year don't mean we want you to stop any plans for evangelism with your local church until 2025. By all means, we want you to continue sharing the gospel with the community. However, these are the areas we'd like our Western Australian church family to focus on as a whole to rekindle and strengthen lifegiving habits over the next few years.

Our focus areas are simple:

- Invest in our relationship with God: Loving God.
- Invest in our relationships within our church families: Loving fellowship.
- Invest in our relationships with people beyond church walls: Loving others.

As Pr Steve Goods says, we have a passion to see everyone sharing Jesus in rhythm with God's heart.

However, every person involved was motivated by a desire to bring glory to God and encouragement to others through their arrangements. Our designers often testify to the blessing they receive by reflecting deeply on the Bible verse they have chosen and how they can best depict it.

A short Dedicatory Service was held on Friday

evening with a group of about 30 family and friends. David Hughes, representing Light of Hope, shared the stories of children whose lives had been impacted by the school. Associate pastor, Megan Hunter, offered a dedicatory prayer. The event was then open to the public.

On Sabbath morning, surrounded by floral interpretations of Bible verses, depicting messages of hope all around the church auditorium, Megan Hunter preached an excellent sermon on the topic "Hope Lasts Forever".

The flower festival was open to the public on Sabbath and Sunday afternoons, with Light of Hope running a café in the church hall. Church members took the opportunity to invite their friends, neighbours and work colleagues to view the floral arrangements and then relax in the café afterwards. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Ministries (ATSIM) ministries in Western Australia and Karla Bidjar Church has received a boost, with the purchase of a new building in Midland. The WA Conference executive committee approved the purchase of the old licensing centre when a proposal was presented to the committee. It outlined the building's potential as an Aboriginal "Centre of Influence" in Midland and the surrounding areas. It is planned that the "Centre" will provide much needed services to the local community.

The first service in planning is an ADRA Op shop. The shop will provide volunteer work, cost effective clothing and other household items. It will also provide income for the "Centre" so that other services can be offered and further building can be accomplished.

Funding for the building included significant funds donated for Aboriginal work some years ago. The Centre will be operated by a team representing Karla Bidjar Church, which will begin to worship at the new location sometime in the new year. The plan is to be open and available almost every day of the week.

On Sabbath, December 10th, at 9:30am there is a free breakfast followed by a Dedication Ceremony. If you would like to attend this special occasion we would love to see you there.



Extension of Life Leads to New Ministry

Eileen Fehlberg seemed to be losing her battle with breast cancer in the middle of 2021. She had an open cancerous wound on her breast which was getting more difficult to care for. She was needing to use a walking stick, a wheelchair and stronger pain medication. It looked like she wouldn't make it to the end of the year.

A scan revealed cancer had spread to the bones in her spine, hips and also to her lungs. A surgeon told her there was nothing he could do and she could only expect to live another 12 months. However, he said he would present her name to an oncologist to see if they could do anything for her. Within a few days the oncology department rang and wanted to see her.

An oncologist looked at the type of breast cancer she had and offered hope. He said although it

was once one of the hardest breast cancers to deal with, it was now one of the easiest! He said she had an 80% chance of success. Though not offering a cure, she should be in full remission and could hopefully look forward to another 5-10 years of life.

Sensing God's leading, Eileen went forward with treatment once a week. After about 2 weeks she noticed the cancerous tumours had stopped growing. After 6 months treatment, a scan showed all cancer gone. She was declared in full remission. A Breast Cancer Care nurse rang and asked what she thought of the results. The Nurse was excited. She said in all her years of working with breast cancer patients she had never seen such results. She sent an email to the oncologist and asked, "Is this God, the result of your drugs, or both?"

Towards the end of 2021 it began to dawn on Eileen that she would live past Christmas. She had greatly improved and no more need for pain killers, the wheelchair, or the walking stick. She could do things again. Out of thankfulness to God she prayed for a ministry. The impression came to read Brenda Walsh's Devotional Book "Strength for Today" and livestream it on Facebook. She was hesitant at first, but the impression grew stronger over the next few weeks. So she made an agreement with God. If Brenda, the author, would give her permission to read her book on Facebook, she would do it. She sent a message to Brenda to ask and the very next day Brenda replied and said, "You can read any of my books on Facebook".

Commencing January 1st, 2022 she recorded her first livestream worship on Facebook. She wasn't sure if it was working so she asked if anyone out there could see it. Back came a reply, "Yes we can see and hear you". She has missed a few days due to busyness or illness but to date has done 266 worships. Many of her Facebook friends watch it on her Facebook page. In addition to that, we send texts to some 160 people daily with the link so they can watch and listen.

Along with reading the devotional, Eileen often tells a relevant Bible Story or personal experience. On the Facebook post she provides a list of Bible passages relating to the topic under the discussion so people can do further study.

Her watching/listening base has steadily increased and she now averages around 100 people who participate each day. These include Aboriginal members and contacts, family members, friends and contacts from over the years, and people from overseas.

Eileen does her livestream worship on site at Mamarapha College one morning each study block, so staff and students can be actively involved. These have been very popular and attract hundreds of views.

Land, rang to ask if she could use Eileen's Bible Study, which includes with her Facebook Post, in her local Uniting Church meetings. Vivien also asked if she could send the link to her sister in another Community. Her sister rang to say how helpful the messages were for her and asked if she could she come to Mamarapha College next year.

Colleen Roberts from Port Augusta finds the messages so helpful. She shares them with quite a number of her relatives and friends.

A lady by the name of Jenny rang one day and asked about the worship links coming on her texts. She said she was enjoying them but wanted to know who was sending them. She had lent her phone to one of our friends, Georgina, from Fitzroy Crossing and I saved the number thinking it was Georgina's new phone number. Jenny was receiving the texts intended for Georgina. She was from Noonkanbah Community in the Kimberley. "Keep the worship messages coming" she said. She has rung a number of times for prayer since that time. We told Pastor John Beck about her so on his itinerary visiting through the Kimberley he travelled the 75 kilometres off the highway to visit. Both Jenny & her husband were keen to sign up to come to Mamarapha College in 2023.

Eileen is thankful for her extension of life and would like to thank those who have faithfully supported her throughout the year. She receives a blessing each time she shares these Bible messages, and she praises God for all the people who are also being blessed.

Justice, Compassion & Love

I have always been fascinated by mottos, be they for businesses, schools or countries. My primary school motto came from Proverbs 1:7 - "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom". "No Pain, No Gain" and, "Perseverance and Success as an Impetus" were my mottos for my ordinary level and secondary level education schools, respectively. At Makerere University, my motto was. "We Build for the Future" while at Lund University, my motto was "Prepared to do Both", i.e., trained in martial as well as scholarly pursuits. When I was at Newcastle University, the motto was- "I Look Ahead". Although, I, like many students, may not have paid much attention to these mottos, looking back I realise that in their uniqueness, the mottos were meant to, and actually did, inspire a certain sense of belonging, servitude and scholarship in students. These mottos were ideals that were subconsciously inbuilt in our day-to-day student life.

A motto is a set of beliefs, ideals or ethical stances that an entity adopts to inspire its workers to take action, to overcome obstacles or to keep working towards a goal.

I recently joined ADRA Australia, whose motto is "Justice, Compassion and Love". ADRA's motto inspires its employees and affiliates to embody compassion, passion and commitment in service to humanity so that every individual is enabled

to live as God intended. This is why ADRA, a Christian organisation, is active in relief, care, advocacy and development. ADRA's approach to services and development is guided by the three words – justice, compassion and love. These three words are based on Micah 6:8 - He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? (The New Revised Standard Version).

Micah's message was true for people of his time just as it is true for the people in our time – that is, a people whose moral condition is corrupt. A people who are either falling deeper into such a condition or a people who are victims of moral disorder and social decay. Merchants, business people and the elite gained enormous wealth through the exploitation of poor farmers, driving them into deeper and deeper depravity. The upsurge in wealth brought with it political power that enabled the elites to feed their corruption, greed, injustice and immorality. The unjust economic practices forced the poor farmers to borrow from the wealthy and merchants to keep their business as a going concern.

One sees that the book of Micah exposes such depravity, and it exhorts us to act on the injustice that the depravity breeds. In addition, in Micah 6:8, Prophet Micah calls us to provide

mercy, transform people's lives and promise the depraved that there are opportunities of hope. At ADRA, we see ourselves as participating in God's mission of holistic transformation by responding to the call in Micah 6:8. ADRA works with people experiencing deprivation and distress to create just and positive change through empowering partnerships and responsible action. Our service reaches people of all nationalities, races, religions and economic standing. We pride ourselves in not isolating anyone in need. We know that the poor bear the image of the Creator and that they have knowledge, abilities and resources that need to be tapped into and harnessed to create a catalyst of change. We always endeavor to treat the poor with respect. This enables the poor to be architects of their own change in their own communities. We seek not to impose solutions upon them, but empower them.

ADRA has a long tradition of social, economic and humanitarian work. Basing our work on justice, compassion and love, we envision a flourishing world in which people live a full life, free from poverty, injustice and conflict. A world at peace with God, nature and one another, as intended and enabled by the Creator. To ADRA, justice, compassion and love are the weightier matters of not only the Old Testament, but the entire revealed Bible. ADRA loves to think that God has commanded us to be committed to practical, down-to-earth exercise of the tripletjustice, compassion and love, in ways that reflect and embody God's commitment to His creation's aim. In seeking justice, ADRA advocates for the unjust structures of society to be transformed in a way that they respond to the needs of the poor and enable them to live meaningfully. In practicing compassion, ADRA aims at responding humanely to human need and suffering following the example of Jesus Christ who went about doing good (Acts 10:38). In addition, ADRA believes in the Pauline approach to ministry, of integrating service and care into ministry, as we serve the poor (see Galatians 2:10). In fact, in Acts 11: 27 - 30, Paul and Barnabas brought relief to the needy people of Judea, whose circumstances

were worsened by famine in their first missionary journey.

By engaging with compassion, ADRA seeks to empathise with the communities we work with, and also with each other. We respond to human need through loving compassion. We work collaboratively for the best outcome for those living in poverty or distress. Working with the poor involves building relationships that lead to mutual change. We welcome welfare activities as important in serving the vulnerable. Welfare activities, however, must be extended to include movement towards value transformation, the empowerment of communities and co-operation in wider issues of justice and compassion. ADRA also partners with churches since the churches are present in the midst of the local communities. The churches' presence in the community places them in a unique position to restore God-given dignity to the disadvantaged by enabling them to produce their own resources and to create solidarity networks.

So, reader, the ADRA triplet motto of justice, compassion and love motivates my colleagues and I, and all of the ADRA volunteers across the country, to have the privilege to share our knowledge, skills, time and affinity with those who need it most, the underprivileged and often forgotten members of society. ADRA does not aim to be impressive about extending social economic compassion but aims to be expressive in her approach in restoring the dignity of the deprived. ADRA is, at its core, a Christian development entity, acting as a as if it is not a cooperate entity, and it is a cooperate organisation as if it is not a Christian entity. With our Christian development links, we engage the communities we serve with Christian passion and commitment. And with our corporate identity, we serve the communities with modern governance systems. This enables us to serve humanity, to live as God as intended.

Afternoon workshops were informative and on Thursday we enjoyed a trip to AQWA in Hillarys.


